Dear Representative Joyce, Representative Bonamici, Representative Kiggans, and Representative Underwood:

AARP, which advocates for the more than 100 million Americans age 50 and older, thanks you for introducing the Improving Care and Access to Nurses (I CAN) Act of 2023 (H.R. 2713). We share your commitment to expanding access to quality health care and believe this bill addresses several barriers to care in Medicare and Medicaid.

Many Medicare and Medicaid restrictions prevent Advance Practice Registered Nurses (APRNs) and other licensed clinicians from performing tasks for which they are educated and highly skilled. For instance, requiring direct physician oversight of certain services often adds extra steps to the process of delivering care, which can add time and expense for patients and family caregivers. This is particularly true in health workforce shortage areas, such as rural areas, where there may be a lack of physicians necessary to order or deliver services.

Updating these rules to reflect current best practices, as described in the 2010 and 2021 National Academy of Medicine *Future of Nursing* reports, would enable Medicare and Medicaid beneficiaries to have direct access to APRNs and other licensed clinicians. Doing so would also reduce red tape and improve provider availability and convenience for individuals and their caregivers. We support the I CAN Act's efforts to improve access to services by optimizing the existing health care workforce.
