# **Ordering of Credentials**

Credentials should be listed as follows:

- (1) Highest <u>earned</u> academic degree is listed <u>first</u>, followed by lower academic degrees if provided/desired.
  - a. Level one: doctoral degree, such as PhD, DNS, DNAP, and including MD
  - b. Level two: master's degree, such as MS or MBA
  - c. Level three: bachelor's degree, such as BSN or BS;
- (2) Licensure and/or certifications, such as <u>CRNA</u>, are listed <u>next</u> (with CRNA coming before any others, such as ARNP; RN should not be used with CRNA);
- (3) U.S. fellowship designations are listed next (such as FAAN);
- (4) Foreign fellowships or designations are listed last.

For information about Military Rank/Title for military members of the AANA, please see below.

### Examples:

Juan Quintana, DNP, MHS, CRNA Bruce Schoneboom, PhD, CRNA, FAAN

**NOTE:** The same rules will apply to credentials presented for non-CRNAs in AANA communications (academic degrees first, etc.).

## **Military Titles and Service**

- The abbreviation of a military title (also called grade or rank) should *precede* the name, and
- The abbreviation of a military service should *follow* the name

#### **Titles**

U.S. Military titles (grades/ranks) should appear as follows:

- In the Army, Navy and Coast Guard, always abbreviate and use upper case
- In the Air Force and Marines, always abbreviate and use upper and lower case

#### **Examples:**

- US Army General = GEN
- US Navy Captain = CAPT

- US Coast Guard Lieutenant = LT
- o US Air Force General = Gen
- US Marine Corps Colonel = Col

#### Service

U.S. Military service should appear as follows:

- Always use upper case
- In the Army, Army Reserve, National Guard, and Navy, the service branch should follow the healthcare organization, such as Army Nurse Corps.
- In the Air Force, USAF precedes the healthcare organization.

### **Examples:**

- o Army Nurse Corps, US Army = ANC, USA
- US Air Force, Nurse Corps = USAF, NC
- o Medical Corps, US Navy = MC, USN

NOTE: The US Marine Corps does not have its own medical or nursing organization; healthcare is provided by the US Navy.

## **Examples of Full Use in Text, All Service Branches**

- GEN Joe Smith, PhD, CRNA, ANC, USA (i.e., Joe Smith, PhD, CRNA, is a general in the Army Nurse Corps of the US Army)
- CAPT Sue Williams, MD, MC, USN (i.e., Sue Williams, MD, is a captain in the Medical Corps of the US Navv)
- Col Bill Jones, MSN, CRNA, USAF, NC (i.e., Bill Jones, MSN, CRNA, is a colonel in the US Air Force Nurse Corps)
